Ada, Alma Flor. **After the Storm.** (E Ad112a)

Ada, Alma Flor. **The Empty Piñata.** (E Ad112e 1999)

A little girl who sets out to buy candy for her new pinata but spends it all on others is rewarded for her generosity.

Ada, Alma Flor. **The Golden Cage.** (E Ad112g 1999)

When his grandmother begins using a wheelchair and spends her days watching the birds through the window, Nicolas thinks he has found the perfect Christmas present for her--a bird of her own--until she tells him why she likes to watch them.

Ada, Alma Flor. **In the Cow's Backyard.** (E Ad112in 1999)

A friendly ant invites a growing menagerie of animals to join him in the hammock in the cow's backyard.

Ada, Alma Flor. **Strange Visitors.** (E Ad112s 1999)

A very cosmopolitan musical troupe is formed over the course of a week as animal after animal shows up at a country house, playing a variety of instruments.

Ada, Alma Flor. **"Turkey for Thanksgiving Dinner?" "No Thanks!"** (E Ad112t 1999)

A spider helps a turkey find a unique way to avoid being eaten for Thanksgiving dinner.

Adams, Pam. **Old Macdonald Had a Farm.** (782.4 OI12 1999)

Matching holes on opposing die-cut pages reveal the animals on Old Macdonald's farm and the sounds they make.

Alborough, Jez. **Where's My Teddy?** (E AI147w 1995)

When a small boy named Eddie goes searching for his lost teddy in the dark woods, he comes across a gigantic bear with a similar problem.

Aliki. **My Five Senses.** (612.8 AL444m 1989)

A simple presentation of the five senses, demonstrating some ways we use them.

Aylesworth, Jim. **Old Black Fly.** (E Ay446o 1995)

Rhyming text and illustrations follow a mischievous old black fly through the alphabet as he has a very busy bad day landing where he should not be.

Baker, Keith. **Who is the Beast?** (E B1744w 1990a)

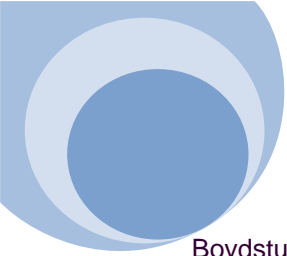
When a tiger suspects he is the beast the jungle animals are fleeing from, he returns to them and points out their similarities.

Barton, Byron. **Little Red Hen.** (398.24 B2856I 1994)

The little red hen finds none of her lazy friends willing to help her plant, harvest, or grind wheat into flour, but all are eager to eat the bread she makes from it.

Bolton, Janet. **My Grandmother's Patchwork Quilt.** (E B6394m 1996)

Alternating pages describe a young girl's life on a farm and how she made a patchwork quilt to capture memories of that life. Includes patterns and instructions for making a similar quilt.



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Boydston, Shirley. **The Busy Forest.** (574.5 B6938b 1995)

Brown, Margaret Wise. **Big Red Barn.** (E B8143br 1989)
Rhymed text and illustrations introduce the many different animals that live in the big red barn.

Cannon, Janell. **Stellaluna.** (E C1645s 1997)
After she falls headfirst into a bird's nest, a baby bat is raised like a bird until she is reunited with her mother.

Clyne, Robyn. **Grandpa's House.** (E C6298g 1995a)

Crews, Donald. **Freight Train.** (E C8675f 1993)
Brief text and illustrations trace the journey of a colorful train as it goes through tunnels, by cities, and over trestles.

Daniel, Claire. **The Apple Farm.** (E D2218a 1996)

Dobeck, Maryann. **Blast Off!** (692.4 D6525b 1996a)

Dowd, Nancy. **One Bee Got on the Bus.** (E D7524a 1996)

Ehlert, Lois. **Eating the Alphabet: Fruits and Vegetables From A to Z.** (E Eh567e 1989a)
An alphabetical tour of the world of fruits and vegetables, from apricot and artichoke to yam and zucchini.

Ehlert, Lois. **Growing Vegetable Soup.** (E Eh567g 1991)
A father and child grow vegetables and then make them into a soup.

Fleming, Denise. **In the Tall, Tall Grass.** (E F6294it 1993)
Rhymed text (crunch, munch, caterpillars lunch) presents a toddler's view of creatures found in the grass from lunchtime till nightfall, such as bees, ants, and moles.

Freeman, Marcia. **Wetlands.** (LB 1585 .N479 1998)

Gardner, Beau. **Have You Ever Seen?** (E G1712h 1994)
Have you ever seen an alligator with antlers, a monster wearing mittens, a zipper on a zebra, or other such alphabetical amusements?

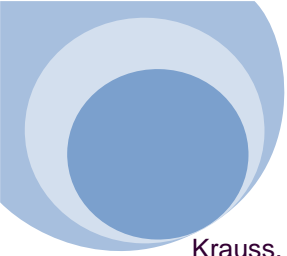
Hayes, Sarah. **Nine Ducks Nine.** (E H3292n 2000)
As Mr. Fox watches and draws closer to nine ducks, one by one they drop out of sight.

Hutchins, Pat. **Doorbell Rang.** (E H9705d 1994)
Each time the doorbell rings, there are more people who have come to share Ma's wonderful cookies.

Jolivet, Joelle. **Zoo Ology.** (590 J6835z 2003)
Brief text and illustrations introduce over three hundred animals, from aardvark to zebu.

Keats, Ezra Jack. **Snowy Day.** (E K2252s 1962)
The adventures of a little boy in the city on a very snowy day.

Kellogg, Steven. **Johnny Appleseed: A Tall Tale.** (921 Ap527k 1996)
Presents the life of John Chapman, better known as Johnny Appleseed, describing his love of nature, his kindness to animals, and his physical fortitude.



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Krauss, Ruth. **Carrot Seed.** (E K8687c 1989)

Despite everyone's dire predictions, a little boy has faith in the carrot seed he plants.

Mangano, Mary Ann. **Walking in the City.** (E M3138w 1995a)

Martin, Bill Jr. **Polar Bear, Polar Bear, What Do You Hear?** (E M3632p 1992)

The polar bear hears a lion roaring, hears a hippopotamus snorting, hears a flamingo fluting, hears a zebra braying, and so on through a varied list of animals.

Marzollo, Jean. **Happy Birthday, Martin Luther King.** (921 K5853ma 1993b)

An introduction to the great civil rights leader.

Numeroff, Laura Joffe. **If You Give a Moose A Muffin.** (E N9176im 1994)

Chaos can ensue if you give a moose a muffin and start him on a cycle of urgent requests.

Numeroff, Laura Joffe. **If You Give a Mouse a Cookie.** (E N9176i 1996)

Relating the cycle of requests a mouse is likely to make after you give him a cookie takes the reader through a young boy's day.

Numeroff, Laura Joffe. **If You Give a Pig a Pancake.** (E N9176ip 2000)

Presents a children's story of the chaos that can happen in the house when you give a pig a pancake.

Play Day in the Park. (796.5 P6988 2006)

Shaw, Charles G. **It Looked Like Spilt Milk.** (E Sh2621 1992)

Simple white shapes on a blue background look like various things, such as an ice-cream cone, a rabbit, and spilled milk, but only on the last page is the true identity of the changing shape revealed.

Step toe, John. **Mufaro's Beautiful Daughters: An African Tale.** (398.23 St457m 1993)

Mufaro's two beautiful daughters, one bad-tempered, one kind and sweet, go before the king, who is choosing a wife.

Voce, Louise. **Over in the meadow: A Counting Rhyme.** (E V8514o 2000)

A counting rhyme describing the activities of various baby animals, from one turtle to ten foxes.

Waddell, Martin. **Farmer Duck.** (E W1175f 1996)

When a kind and hardworking duck nearly collapses from overwork, while taking care of a farm because the owner is too lazy to do so, the rest of the animals get together and chase the farmer out of town.

Williams, Sue. **I Went Walking.** (E W6754i 1990a)

During the course of a walk, a young boy identifies animals of different colors.

Wood, Audrey. **Napping House.** (E W8502n 1994)

In this cumulative tale, a wakeful flea atop a number of sleeping creatures causes a commotion, with just one bite.

Wood, Audrey. **Silly Sally.** (E W8502s 1999)

A rhyming story of Silly Sally, who makes many friends as she travels to town--backward and upside down.

Wood, Don and Audrey. **The Little Mouse, the Red Ripe Strawberry, and the Big Hungry Bear.**
(E W8503i 1996)

Little Mouse worries that the big, hungry bear will take his freshly picked, ripe, red strawberry for himself.
