To earn the Pre-K-3 license, UW-Eau Claire students must complete the following UW-River Falls courses: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • TED 225, Developmental Learning (Spring); • TED 335, Kindergarten Curriculum (Spring); • TED 345, Parent Education; • TED 340, Pre-Kindergarten Curriculum (Fall); • TED 330, Infant/Toddler Program (Fall); • TED 400, Supervision and Management of Early Childhood Programs (Spring); and • TED 424: Inquiry: Society and Environment Early Elementary <p>In addition, UW-Eau Claire students are expected to attend an all day non-credit communications workshop with UW-River Falls students at UW-River Falls on a Saturday in February one time during their studies. This workshop will focus on communicating with parents and colleagues in early childhood settings.</p> <p>Post Baccalaureate students earning the add-on 809 and Pre-K-3 licenses will be required to complete student teaching experiences. <p>How much additional time will it take to complete the additional certification programs?</p>	<p>To a certain extent it depends on the time that a student is admitted to the Department of Special Education Early Childhood Special Education Program. Currently students admitted at the end of their sophomore year and take SPED 200, SPED 205, and SPED 220 prior to admission are completing their studies in four years and nine additional weeks of student teaching if they take a small number of courses during one or two summer sessions. This is changing and students will be taking an additional eighteen weeks of student teaching rather than nine. The program will take a minimum of four and a half years to complete all requirements for ECSE and Pre-K-3.</p>	<p>The Teacher Education Program at UW-River Falls is a five year program. If UW-River Falls students complete studies via distance learning during the academic year and courses offered on the UW-River Falls campus during the summer they should be able to complete the ECSE add on license during their studies that currently take five years to complete.</p>
