



## MLA Works Cited Entries

When writing in MLA style, you include a works cited page at the end of your paper. This page contains full citations of all the sources that used in your work. Here are some basic rules to follow when creating your works cited page:

1. Begin your works cited page after the body of your paper and on a separate page.
2. Title the page Works Cited (centered, not bolded, not italicized).
3. Double space all citations.
4. Use a hanging indent (0.5 inches) for second and all subsequent lines of each citation.
5. Organize all entries alphabetically by the last names of authors.

### Citing a Variety of Source Types

#### Book

Author last name, first name. *Title of Book*. City of publication: Publisher, Year of publication. Medium of publication.

Uzawa, Hirofumi. *Economic Theory and Global Warming*. Cambridge: Cambridge University Press, 2003. Print.

#### Journal Article

Author last name, first name. "Title of Article." *Title of Journal* Volume#. Issue# (Year of publication): Page number(s). Medium of publication. Date of access.

Ryan, Katy. "Revolutionary Suicide in Toni Morrison's Fiction." *African American Review* 34.3 (2000): 389-412. Print.

#### Article in a Periodical (Newspaper or Magazine)

Author last name, first name. "Title of Article." *Title of Periodical* Publication date: Pages. Medium of publication.

Buchman, Dana. "A Special Education." *Good Housekeeping* Mar. 2006: 143-48. Print.

## Entire Web Site

Editor, Author, or Compiler (if available). *Name of Site*. Affiliated publisher or sponsor, Date of creation (if available). Medium of publication. Date of access.

Felluga, Dino. *Guide to Literary and Critical Theory*. Purdue University, 28 Nov. 2003. Web. 10 May 2006.

## Individual Web Page

Editor, Author, or Compiler (if available). "Title of Page." *Name of Site*. Affiliated publisher or sponsor, Date of Creation (if available). Medium of publication. Date of access.

McMillan, Darcy. "How to Make Delicious Dinners on a Tight Budget." *eHow*. Demand Media, 14 Oct. 2007. Web. 24 Feb. 2009.

## Web Image

Name or username of author (if available). "Title of Image." Medium of image. *Name of Site*. Affiliated publisher or sponsor, Date of creation (if available). Medium of publication. Date of access.

brandychloe. "Great Horned Owl Family." Photograph. *Webshots*. American Greetings, 22 May 2006. Web. 5 Nov. 2009.

## Online Video

Author's Name or Poster's Username. "Title of Image or Video." Media Type. *Name of Website*. Name of Website's Publisher, date of posting. Medium. date retrieved.
