COURSE OBJECTIVES IN TERMS OF STUDENT OUTCOMES

At the end of the semester, students should perform at the Novice Mid proficiency level according to the national standards described by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL). The benchmarks to attain in all modes of communication are described in the NCSSFL-ACTFL performance indicators for language learners as follows: www.actfl.org/global_statements/.

- 1. Interpretive Communication:** I can identify the general topic and some basic information in both very familiar and everyday contexts by recognizing practiced or memorized words, phrases, and simple sentences in texts that are spoken, written or signed.
- 2. Interpersonal Communication:** I can communicate in spontaneous spoken, written or signed conversations on both very familiar and everyday topics, using a variety of practiced or memorized words, phrases, simple sentences, and questions.
- 3. Presentational Communication:** I can present information on both very familiar and everyday topics using a variety of practiced or memorized words, phrases, and simple sentences through spoken, written or signed language.

4. **Intercultural Communication:** In my own and other cultures I can identify products and practices to help me understand perspectives on the topics discussed in this course.

LE CORE AND SPANISH 102: For all students who began at UWEC in fall 2016 or later, this course meets the requirement for the **Written and Oral Communication** outcome (S1) in the new **LE core**. The skills and knowledge needed to meet the outcome will be taught through lecture, discussion and activities. You will have the opportunity to demonstrate your progress on the outcome in one of the course assignments chosen by the instructor. This assessment may be a part of your course grade, or may instead simply be used to evaluate learning in the course as a whole. For students who started prior to fall 2016, Span 102 provides credit in the GE1 category.

EXTRA CREDIT: No other extra credit work is permitted under any circumstance.

PARTICIPATION (10 %)

- Class participation is essential. Participation is assessed on a daily basis and grades will be given at midterm and at the end of the semester.
- Remember that **attending class does not mean having participation points**. You can come to class and have a zero in participation.
- You are expected to be an active member in class and to come prepared for each class period. All **handwritten homework** should be completed by the beginning of class. The participation grade is the sum of your attendance, your **preparedness (handwritten homework)**, and your **class participation**.
- Criteria for evaluating class participation are determined as follows:

9 –10: student is always prepared (assignments always completed), participates voluntarily, has useful and thought-provoking comments, asks interesting and related questions voluntarily, brings to class pertinent information read out of class, shows interest in what is being studied in class. Actively contributes to group work. Routinely uses Spanish to speak with other students and conduct coursework.

8 – 9: student is generally prepared (assignments mostly completed) responds to questions asked, and asks questions on topics being discussed, but not necessarily voluntarily, contributes to class, seems to be interested in class discussions. Often uses Spanish to speak with others and conduct coursework.

7 – 8: student sometimes comes to class prepared, generally does not contribute to class discussions, handwritten homework is sometimes finished, asks few questions pertaining to subject being studied. Does not regularly use Spanish to speak to others or conduct coursework. Cell phone is occasionally visible or heard.

6 – 0: student in generally not prepared for class, rarely completes assignments, participates in class discussions or asks questions on the subject being studied, does not show interest in the class. Rarely uses Spanish to speak with others and conduct coursework. Cell phone is often visible or heard. / Student is absent (0 points).

ON-LINE HOMEWORK (15 %)

- **On-line weekly assignments (due every Monday):** weekly homework assignments related to the content covered in class during the week will be assigned on-line in the *Panorama* Supersite. For each activity, you will receive unlimited attempts. The deadline for these assignments will be **before** class begins the Monday after [See tentative course calendar for due dates]. Keep in mind that there will not be extensions due to technical difficulties, so complete the homework promptly.
- **On-line daily assignments (due before every class):** These are assigned daily and must be submitted in the *Panorama* Supersite **before** class on the due date (always next day of classes). For each activity, you will receive unlimited attempts. If you regularly and carefully complete the homework assignments, you will be better prepared for exams, and class participation.

COMPOSITIONS (15%) → 7.5 % each

- You will write **two compositions**. [See tentative course calendar for due dates]
- Compositions will average a half page to one page and will be typed, double spaced with standard margins and twelve-point font.
- **The instructor will give you specific directions and rubrics on each composition. You must follow them carefully. Failure to do so will lower your grade.**

CHAPTER EXAMS (30% → 10% each) AND FINAL WRITTEN EXAM (10 %)

- There will be three chapter exams (10 % each) in this course. These exams will cover all the materials included in the chapters of our textbook that have been covered. [See tentative course calendar for due dates]
- **Requests for changes in the date of the exam will not be honored except in the cases described in MAKE-UP POLICY (below), if the student submits all the required documentation.**
- **The date of the common final exam will not be decided by the University Office of Scheduling until after the eight week of the semester. Your instructor will notify you as soon as the information is available. Please do not make any plans to leave Eau Claire before the end of finals week until your instructor has informed you of the date and time of the common final examination for this course.**

FINAL ORAL EXAM (10%)

- There will be an oral component of the final exam. [See tentative course calendar for dates]
- The format of the oral exam will be explained by the instructor later in the semester.

LATE WORK: No late work is accepted for credit.

OFFICIAL POLICIES:

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

- Attendance is essential for this course.
- Attendance is checked daily. Authorized absences are those for which you present (i) certification that you are representing the UWEC in a University-sponsored event; (ii) certification that you are participating in an approved field trip listed as a requirement for a course in which you are enrolled; (iii) a medical excuse (to be given to the instructor the day you return to class), signed by a physician, and indicating that a medical condition prevented you from attending class; or (iv) special medical conditions excused by the Dean of Students' Office. All other absences are counted as unauthorized.
- Unauthorized absences are those for which you do not present a medical excuse or certification as described above. Early vacation departures and late vacation arrivals are not authorized absences. Keep

in mind that your instructor will assume that your absence is unauthorized unless you present evidence to the contrary before your absence or immediately upon your return to class.

- Please note: If you must miss class, whether the absence is authorized or not, it is your responsibility to be prepared for the next class. Contact a classmate to find out what you missed and what the homework is for the next class.

MAKEUP POLICY:

- Make-ups are allowed for in-class compositions and exams **ONLY** in the case of authorized absences.
- If you know ahead of time that you must miss an exam or an in-class composition, you must arrange with your instructor to make up the exam or in-class composition before the scheduled date. Please contact your instructor **at least one week before** the planned absence.
- If you miss an exam or an in-class composition due to an extreme emergency circumstance, you must contact the instructor **before you return to class** to determine if a makeup can be given. Documentation of the extenuating circumstances will be required.
- Keep in mind that participation points, homework, in-class compositions, exams or other in-class assignments that are missed because of unauthorized absences cannot be made up.
- **Talk to your instructor** if you have concerns about how missed coursework will impact your grade.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR WEEKLY ONLINE HOMEWORK ASSIGNMENTS:

- **Take time** to do these carefully! Plan 2-3 hours, and do what you can every day – **do not wait until Sunday**.
- **Read the directions carefully**. Read sentences in the activity for understanding, looking up what verbs mean if you aren't sure. Also look up verb conjugations if you aren't sure.
- **Plan ahead**. I am happy to help if you have any problems or questions! Remember to let me know **before** class or office hours on Friday. If you wait until the weekend, I will not be available to help you before the homework is due.

PLEASE NOTE:

- You may record your grades and use the syllabus to estimate your overall final grade. Your instructor will not estimate overall or final grades.
- If you are concerned with your progress in the class, your instructor can meet with you to talk about effective study strategies and to help you master the material covered in class and improve your language skills. For extra help on a regular basis, the UWEC [Academic Skills Center](#) also provides free tutors for students taking Spanish 102.

F.A.Q.s:

Q *Why does my instructor use only Spanish and expect me to do the same?*

A Studies show students really *learn* languages if they're used to communicate actual plans, needs, ideas & questions – doing jobs together, figuring out meanings, getting/giving info. Good language models & plenty of time hearing the language are key—so the instructor teaches IN Spanish.

Students so intent on finishing a job that they use English to do it miss the point – & get lower grades. Even discussing the weekend, giving directions or settling who does what is a valuable chance to talk **in Spanish** (what most of you say you want to be able to do). Students usually **only practice speaking Spanish out loud during class** — so we make the most of it.

Q *Why don't we get longer grammar lectures? If it's unclear at home I want a full explanation in class.*

A You will study grammar points at home with the book; class is for quick summaries & clarifications along with **lots** of practice. Long lectures cut practice time. More complex questions/problems are for office hours.

Q *Why do we interact so much in class? Games and activities are fun, but they waste time, don't they?*

A Language learning is like learning to drive. In Driver Ed, you get “rules of the road” from a book, but real driving is done behind the wheel; grammar study gives you the rules, but you really learn by doing. We do all kinds of activities to give you reasons to talk to each other in Spanish.

It may not be like Spanish classes you remember, and it may take you a bit out of your comfort zone – but, with some diligent effort & cooperative practice on your part, this class can give you a real shot at actually speaking Spanish.
